FEARFUL TIMES

What else will have happened by the time this has been printed and you are reading it?

I'm writing in mid-June. In the last few weeks we have seen terrorist attacks at a concert in Manchester, outside the Houses of Parliament, and on London Bridge: and then the horror of the fire at Grenfell Tower. We are still waiting to hear just how many lives were lost in that latest tragedy, and as the waiting continues, this morning brought news of a yet another brand of terror, the vicious copy-cat attack on worshippers from a Finsbury mosque.

Each of these terrible events will have had its own origins; individuals and small groups have been so stirred up to hatred of others' ways of life that bringing death and destruction seems not just acceptable but even justified and admirable. The destruction of a tower block may have been

the product of negligence, of cost-cutting and short-sighted planning; already there are demands for the fullest of enquiries into what has led to so many deaths, so many homeless in one of the wealthiest corners of our country.

Between all of these stories, however, there runs a common thread. They could only happen where people and institutions have abandoned an understanding of the absolute value of every human being, whatever each person's background, age, ethnicity, wealth or poverty, culture or faith.





We speak, very easily, in the Christian tradition of humanity 'being made in the image of God.' Implicit in that phrase is a profound respect for each individual. The small contribution each of us can make to the healing of our country's hurts is to live out that respect, to remember that neighbours, friends and strangers and visitors,

people we read about in the news, the ones who are celebrated and the ones who are belittled or condemned, are not just made in the image of God but are loved by God, just as we are.

From late in the evening of 15th June, there were a series of strange comings and goings at Grange Primary School, Wickford. Tents of various sized popped up on the field, the playground was piled high with cardboard boxes, and miles of hand-made bunting was hung everywhere. A small team of people could be seen scurrying around carrying carpets, tables, pom poms, and logs.



By 11am on the 17th, when Grange Fest was officially opened by the mayor, there was a large stage, arena, portaloos, fast food vans, a converted VW camper-van cocktail bar, and marquees and tents full of activities and all beautifully decorated. It was just want the head mistress, Lyn Corderoy, had imagined when she first came up with the idea of running a day-long family festival celebrating the arts for the community of Wickford.

There were ten hours of performances from local dancers, singers, martial arts groups, musicians of all ages, and it was great to see the Air Cadets and ensembles from Grange and Bromfords schools performing too. There was

also an exhibition of work by local artists – again of all ages- and the chance to create your own works of art on the day. Around the site, which was organised into the music, theatre, craft and story zones, there were a huge variety of free



activities, including drumming and singing workshops, drama workshops for pre-schoolers, creative writing sessions, story trails, and woolly-octopus making. There was the change to create huge chalk works of art on the playground, to build enormous towers, mazes and forts out of boxes, weave on giant looms in the nature trail and to 'take a paint brush for a walk'.




People from Wickford and slightly further afield in Essex gave generously of their time and their talents among others, illustrator Tom Knight came from Mersea, and the Great Antonio bought his bed of nails from Colchester. It was also great to have Wickford library there, reading stories, signing up new members and promoting their summer reading challenge for primary

All the feedback was incredibly positive, and despite the very sticky hot weather, great fun was had by all - it was truly a celebration of creativity and the arts for all, and hopefully sparked a few imaginations.

INEQUALITY – WHAT'S THE PROBLEM?

Last month, I was privileged to be invited to contribute to a 'colloquium' (i.e., an academic talking shop!) on the ethics of equality and inequality at the McDonald Centre for Theology, Ethics, and Public Life at Christ Church, Oxford University.

Over the past few years I have published a few academic articles on equality, and I gave a lecture setting out a Christian view of equality earlier this year at Chelmsford Theological Society. It was a great thrill to be able to put this work to good use and to represent Wickford and Runwell in a small group that included Nigel Biggar (Regius Professor of Moral and Pastoral Theology at Oxford University), Andrew Henley (Professor of Entrepreneurship and Economics, Cardiff Business School), and Nick Townsend (Tutor in Christian Doctrine and Ethics at the University of Kent).

Academic discussions like these might (and often do) seem dry and disconnected from the real world. But in the shadow of the Grenfell fire, the seriousness of the issue of inequality was painfully obvious.

Across the day we talked through what the Bible might (or might not) have to say about equality and inequality, then about theological ideas of equality, and finally we explored political philosophy.

I think this discussion is far too important to be left to academics, however. I'd love to hear what you think. Perhaps you might like to reflect on some of the questions the colloquium considered:

- What might passages such as 2 Corinthians 8 and 9, Galatians 3:28, the Magnificat, and the early chapters of Acts tell us about equality, if anything?
- In order to believe that every human has equal value, is it necessary to believe in God?
- What specifically is wrong with inequality?
- When it comes to stuff, what's more important: that people have the same, or that people have sufficient?
- How much is enough?


My own work on equality has led me to believe that what God desires of us is that we give equal *care* to all those in need. Talk of aiming for strict sameness, or of simply needing to provide "sufficient" are red herrings. We are called to *love* - and that means responding to different needs in different ways, through a sincere willingness to give of ourselves for others.

EVERY DAY DISCIPLES

What does it mean to be a disciple and have Christ as your friend?

In his book, *Being Disciples*, Rowan Williams says that "discipleship means being a student" (if we take the literal meaning of the Greek word used in the New Testament). But Rowan goes on to explain that Christian discipleship "doesn't mean turning up once a week for a course, it is not an intermittent state either, it is a relationship that continues and grows". As disciples of Christ we follow Christ and have a relationship with him.



What might that relationship look like? I want to tell you about two of my relationships.

The first is my relationship with Tom. Tom is my little Yorkshire terrier and our relationship has grown considerably since Clare passed away. Tom looks at me with his puppy dog eyes when he wants something. He hangs his head when he knows he has done something wrong. And he is really pleased to see me, wagging his tail, when I get home from work or from church. Those of you who have had dogs will know what I mean!

But the strength of our relationship is twofold. Firstly it is one of trust: he trusts me with his life - he knows that when I feed him it is OK and I will not harm him. He trusts me to pick him up and not to hurt him. And of course I trust him: I trust he won't bite me! Secondly, it is about love, I love him and I hope he loves me. *That* is the strength of a relationship but it has to be two-way: there are two parties involved, relationships are about giving and receiving. If it is not two-way, if it is not mutual, then it almost becomes idolisation, one side regarding the other with blind adoration or devotion.

The second relationship is the relationship I had with my Dad. Yes, I looked up to him with adoration and probably even with some devotion. I used to look up to him, watch what he did and studied him and how he did things. Hang on moment - "I used to look up to him, watch what he did and studied him and how he did things." — doesn't that sound like discipleship? Though I wouldn't have described my relationship with my Dad as discipleship, it was a relationship in which I loved him and I know he loved me: it was a full-on two-way relationship.



The film, *The Shack*, which is in the cinemas at the moment, shows us something of the relationship that God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit has with us. It's a relationship in which God hurts alongside us, as any parent would with their child.

I think this is the real meaning of being a disciple of Christ. Yes, we are followers of Christ, but we are also people who have a real loving relationship with God. A real twoway loving relationship that God –

Father, Son and Holy Spirit – has with us.

How do we live and show our relationship with God to those around us? How can we be disciples *all* the time? We only need to look at the news recently to see how people have reacted towards each other. I think these reactions tell us something about living as disciples.

In Manchester, London Bridge and around Grenfell Tower, communities have been devastated and many people impacted. But look at how people responded to these events. In their love and kindness, by opening their hearts, churches, mosques and other places opening to provide

shelter, food and comfort, they have shown us important parts of discipleship. We have seen people of love, people who can come together for the common good. It was not just Christians, but people of all faiths, who came together to show love to those impacted, not expecting or demanding payment, just acting out of love for their neighbours.



I think also that in these actions we are not only sharing our love of God with the people around us but we are sharing our love with God. I wonder if this is what Jesus meant when he sent out the original twelve disciples to go "to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" and "proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near'"? Not by words, or with a great flourish but by showing love to those in need, when they need it.

ST CATHERINE'S 'A MEAL ON SUNDAY' QUARTERLY COMMUNITY GATHERINGS

Loneliness in today's society has become a real problem and people who live on their own find Sunday to be the most difficult day of the week. Twelve years ago, St Catherine's started holding 'A Meal on Sunday', which has been held quarterly since. A team of 3-4 people prepare a two-course meal in St Catherine's Hall for around 30 people who live on their own.

Through health problems now being experienced by our volunteers we are really in need of more help going forward. Is this something you might be able to consider doing just once a year? The meals are held on the second Sunday of the months of January, April, July and October, starting at 12.30 – 1.00 pm.

Until now the meal has been a roast dinner, as most find that this is the easiest meal to prepare, although another type of meal could be made. As well as cooking, there are other ways to help, setting up tables, serving the meals, washing up etc.

This is not a fundraising event but an outreach to the lonely. It is very rewarding because the people so enjoy the company, and the fellowship, and come from all around the parish.


A SHARED PASSION

Shepshed near Loughborough in Leicestershire is a provincial town with the usual glories and problems. Below is an account of what happened when a group of churches in the town sought to address the frustrations faced by the young people there. It is a good reminder of what God can achieve through the care paid by churches to the needs of their communities, and is an interesting parallel to what continues in Wickford & Runwell through our Gateway Project.

In 2007, with his Manse and Church in the town centre of Shepshed, the Baptist minister was well positioned to observe the town's young people in the evenings and at weekends. Many of them would congregate in the town centre, call in at the chippy and the mini market, then wander about listlessly, sometimes getting into mischief. There was a local park they could go to in the summer, but in the winter the high street is not a very hospitable alternative and they were an easy target for drug pushers. It would be nice, the minister thought, if they had an indoor place that they could go to, relax with their friends and enjoy some refreshments alongside some helpful, trained youth workers.

There had been a youth group at the church but getting through the church door had proved intimidating to many. An indoor meeting place for these young people was another impossible dream he thought. Where would he find the accommodation, the money and the staff? Best forget it. But the idea would not go away. So he prayed; he took the idea to the town's next 'Churches Together' meeting. His fellow Christian Church leaders enthused over the idea; this they thought gave them a vision of how to reach the young people of their town. They prayed together and before long, with hard work, things began to happen. A project management team was formed, a building secured, funding agreed from the Anglican Diocese of Leicester for a youth worker and a programme of fund raising started.

With the help of some twenty volunteers in 2009 PASSION was born, a drop in centre for young people between 11-18 years of age giving them a safe space in the centre of Shepshed which is open Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings. About 130 young people a week take advantage of this facility, with socialising, indoor games, and Christian counselling where they can talk about their problems.



Our Cover Photo Explained:

The bee in the photograph is roosting! It sleeps like this after clamping its powerful jaws onto the plant! It is one of the very few and rather rare Coelioxys bees that live in the UK, and I spotted this one near the river in Marsh Farm Country Park. The Coelioxys bees are commonly known as Sharp-tailed Bees. These are a variety of "cuckoo bee", so named because like the infamous birds, they lay their eggs in the nests created by a host bee, the Leaf-cutter Bee! These cuckoo bees are usually active from June to September. When a leafcutter bee has finished her nest, she plugs the entrance with a wall of leaf fragments precisely to thwart predators and parasites. Unfortunately for the host, the Sharp-tailed Bee has an abdomen specially equipped with a blade-like tip. She simply slices a gash in the leaf wall and lays her own egg inside. The larva hatches before the leafcutter grub and crushes the host egg with its powerful jaws before tucking into the pollen ball which the female Leaf-cutter Bee had provided for her own young. Nature never ceases to surprise!
