## ***On leaving ..... and remaining***

Google the words 'leave' and 'remain' just at the moment and, not surprisingly, what pops up are innumerable references to our current political crisis, and the complexities of our relationship to the 2016 referendum, to the rest of Europe, and to each other in our differing attitudes and opinions.

But for me, the words have a more personal significance.

On 17 November I shall preside at my last service as team rector in Wickford and Runwell, and a few days later all my possessions, Gizmo the cat, and I will be leaving, heading off for the Black Country, where I shall begin to explore what it means to be retired. 'But what are you going to *do*?' is a question I have faced very, very often in the last year. I am sure that in time I shall become just as busy as many of my retired friends in and about Wickford. Firstly, though, I need to stop for a while, and to stop for a while open afresh to the presence and possibilities of God. I find myself quoting lines from the priest-poet David Scott, in his poem 'Retirement'

'To stop doing one thing, and discover  
what refuses to be laid aside.

What keeps compelling me to be attentive?  
Nothing new perhaps; just former things  
attentively revived.'

Leaving, of course, means leaving behind all you who remain. There has been so much to take delight in during my years here, in all the privileges of parish ministry, laughing and crying with others, marking the beginnings and ends of lives, sharing the seasons of the church's year, teaching and so often learning, breaking bread together. Above all, I give thanks for the ways in which our three churches have begun to come together in worship, in service, in witness. Thank you for allowing me to be part of the life of this parish.

Clergy come and (particularly in the last year or so), they go! You, the church in this place, remain. With uncertainty over new clergy appointments, the shape of the future for our parish and churches is still unclear; the likelihood is that it will, as always, be different from the past. I have both hope and trust that the faithfulness and the openness to God which I have encountered here will sustain and energise you in whatever is to come, shaping a future in which God's kingdom and God's love are both shown and known.

## The Gateway Project

This initiative of Paul Waldron's opened in 2013. Yes, an astonishing 6 years ago! Since then the project has regularly opened its doors on Thursday mornings and we have, unfortunately, seen the number of people attending increase.

There are many reasons for them needing help; unemployment, low wages, delay in benefit or change in personal circumstances. At first the volunteers packed bags with a variety of tinned and packaged goods. Paul soon realised that it would be better to allow each client to choose their own, to minimise wastage. They are given a form to fill in, and 8 boxes to tick from the range of goods on offer. At one of our very first sessions, someone asked if there was any shampoo. Now toiletries are frequently requested from the church members.

The drop off point in the Co-op also came from an idea from our team. This has proved to be very successful and also allows non church goers to contribute to the scheme.

Paul has now left to work at St Mungo's and his role has been taken over by Barbara Church. Latterly we had been receiving produce from Tesco. This was almost 'out of date' and therefore could not be sold, but is of course perfectly edible.

Now Barbara collects similar goods from not only the Co-op, but also Aldi and Greggs. Now plates of Danish pastries and sausage rolls are available to eat with the cups of tea or coffee instead of biscuits. Fruit, vegetables and bread are collected enthusiastically and nothing goes to waste. There was so much fresh produce a couple of weeks ago that tinned goods were not handed out for the first hour. Almost all the clients request milk and tea or coffee and biscuits which explains why these commodities are requested nearly every week.

As you will realise this is the last edition of the parish magazine for the foreseeable future. Please remember the Gateway project, not only in your prayers, but also in your giving. The occasional carton of milk or tin of meat or fish or even a tube of toothpaste, added to your weekly shopping basket will help the needy of Wickford and Runwell so much.

photographs, was really interesting and I think we all learnt something new about the history of our town. Molly Hoyle will be our speaker on October 3<sup>rd</sup> when she will speak on the M.U. Theme and she will be bringing her MU enterprises stall, so we will be able to purchase Christmas cards, diaries etc. The evening meeting in October is a talk by Kent Lowe from The Dogs Trust.

Our thoughts and prayers have been with Caroline, her mother and family these past few weeks during her father's illness. His funeral was Friday September 20<sup>th</sup>. we look forward to welcoming her back to our meetings in the near future .

### **A VISIT TO MARY SUMNER HOUSE**

On 15<sup>th</sup> August a visit had been arranged for the Basildon Deanery of The Mothers' Union for Members who wanted to go. Having been a member of The Mothers' Union for over 25 years myself; I had never been to see this wonderful place in the City of Westminster. I was excited to be able to go, and it was so nice to have a companion too, as Barbara Plummer from The Wickford & Runwell Branch wanted also to go. We met other members at Emmanuel Church in Billericay, a party of eight altogether. We were very fortunate to have the Street Pastors mini bus to take us which was wonderful and our driver was very helpful and remained very calm when he came upon a diversion.

Upon arrival we were shown into the wonderful rooms with various artefacts; portraits, photographs, the wonderful tapestry Mothers' Union Banner, which was stunningly beautiful. Our guide explained that recently this had been looked at by a professional who reported that the stitches used and the type of embroidery work isn't worked today ( a lost art ). The colours are so vivid, clearly it has been very well preserved and protected from the elements.

There are many gifts from various countries in the worldwide Mothers' Union, including a beautiful picture burnt on wood from Uganda. The hundreds of worked squares that make up the tapestry (for the World Wide Council in 1998) are from all over the world too, some very intricate work, including a square from Chelmsford Diocese's then Link

branches– Myanmar Toungoo, George and Hpa-an.

During the 2<sup>nd</sup> World war, Mary Sumner House was damaged by air raids; stained-glass windows were smashed. They have been replaced over time and look amazing. At the first landing there is a very tall stained-glass window with leaded margins with the words 'FOR LOVE OF GOD AND HOME'; this came from St' Jude's Chapel, Whitechapel, to replace one that had been damaged.

We joined the Midday prayers in the Chapel which is decked with many wooden chairs carved with various names in memory of loved ones, some in memory of Mothers' Union Branches that have closed. There is one carved with William Wilberforce, the grandfather of Emily Wilberforce's husband Ernest (Emily and Ernest were married in 1874. Emily was the Central President of the Mothers' Union in 1915 and it was her idea to have a dedicated building for M.U which resulted in the opening of Mary Sumner House in 1925: Mary was the founder of Mothers' Union. A panel in the wall near the entrance of Mary Sumner House commemorates the opening of this house by H.R.H The Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles. Midday prayers are said each day and the staff on duty all meet to join in prayer.

### **MARY SUMNER'S PERSONAL PRAYER.**

All this day, Oh Lord, let me touch  
As many lives as possible for thee  
And every life I touch,  
Do thou by this spirit quicken,  
Whether through the word I speak,  
The prayer I breathe, or the life I live. Amen

We ate our lunch in the Princess Mary room. Barbara and I sat at the hugely long table and chatted with other M.U members, one of whom had only recently married and was very young in comparison to me. Afterwards, Barbara and I decided to go for a walk as it was such a beautiful day. We walked through to the river Thames with Westminster Abbey and Westminster bridge to our left. Another bridge, to our right, turned out to be Lambeth Bridge; we were so pleased to find its name on a plaque and I said to Barbara 'Oh, my mum was born in Lambeth Hospital' and I just got that kind of feeling of 'fitting in' because of my family heritage.

Returning to Mary Sumner House we were able to continue to explore . Some Members had their photograph taken sitting in a very old carved wooden chair with beautiful burgundy leather upholstery and a plaque 'The Mothers' Union.'On a wall hangs a



Charter with the Red Seal of Queen Elizabeth II listing the five Aims of the Mothers' Union ( and lots of legal content).

Although Mary Sumner House is no longer used as a hostel due to health and safety legislation, the rooms are constantly in use, especially by MPs because it is so close to the Houses of Parliament. This provides income to go towards maintenance and upkeep of the house.

Thanks go to Janet Radley for assisting with the arrangements for our visit, to Pauline from Billericay for booking our visit and to our Street Pastor who drove us there.

'Saying Goodbye' (part of the Mariposa Trust) are returning to Chelmsford in October with another Baby loss support remembrance and support service.

The Mariposa Trust is one of the UK's leading charities, with its core objective being to support people who have lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in infancy. It was founded in 2012, by Zoe and Andy Clark-Coates, who saw a critical lack of support for people like them, who had gone through baby loss. With over 258,000 babies being lost yearly in the UK alone, the charity needed to be able to offer not only a comprehensive package of befriending and support but also national baby loss remembrance services (called Saying Goodbye Services), for people to join together and remember the children they had lost. 4 years on over 100 services have taken place at Cathedrals and Minsters across the UK, US and France, and 2019 will see a further 20 take place.

On the 13th October at 6pm in Chelmsford Cathedral the trust is holding one of its Saying Goodbye services

So who is the service for?

Anyone who has either personally lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth or in early years, or who has been affected by a family members or friends loss. Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children. This may be due to circumstance, infertility or for other reasons - but all are welcome. Babies and children are also invited to come with their family, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.

# ***The Earth is the Lord's .....***

*Amidst all the other political noise, protests by schoolchildren and a United Nations summit on the challenge of climate change focus our minds on what for many is the biggest question facing us all.*

*Bishop Stephen sent out this letter in September*

Dear friends in Christ,

## **Taking action to change climate change**

Two years ago when I visited our partner diocese of Marsabit in Kenya it had not rained for over 18 months. Bishop Qampicha drove me across the diocese, close to the border with Somalia. We passed dried up rivers where I saw an elephant digging for water with its trunk in the river bed. I visited villages where the water hole had been empty for months. We went to a reservoir where many people gathered with their animals, but I was told there was probably only enough water left there for another two months. People were travelling vast distances to come to it. Fighting regularly broke out, fuelling already anxious and volatile tribal tensions. We came across nomadic people who had abandoned the lifestyle of centuries to settle by the edge of the one tarmac road that went through the area. They showed us the skeletons of their animals that had died. They now spent their days by the side of the road waiting for the little aid that was available to fill their containers with water.

I was witnessing a whole way of life disappearing, and with it, violence was escalating: scarcity of water was the reason. Everywhere we went children hailed us as we drove by. At first I thought they were just pleased to see us. This is true of children everywhere in the world. Then I saw they were shaking upturned empty plastic bottles. Yes, they were pleased to see us: they knew we had water on board. And they were very thirsty. Most painful of all, I saw some children drinking water from what appeared to me to be a dirty, stagnant and semi-polluted brook. I dread to think what manner of diseases that water contained. But, the thing is, if you are very thirsty you will drink whatever is available.

Kenya used to measure the year by the two seasons of the short and long rains. But what was once so predictable is now erratic. Drought is followed by flood. And uncertainty only breeds further uncertainty. A whole region is thirsting.

But it isn't just Kenya. Our world is facing a climate emergency. Our faith tells us the world was created by God and that as part of that creation we have responsibilities for

it. Scientists tell us that we need to make large changes fast to avoid catastrophic threats to the conditions that support life on earth. Images in the media of the fires destroying the Amazon have brought the immense damage being done to our world into sharp focus. The actions of young people in particular Greta Thunberg have also spoken truth into the situation and challenged us about our way of living.

Christians across our diocese are engaged in seeking to prayerfully respond to climate change. Our faith is a response to the good news of the gospel. This good news invites us to live lives that proclaim that truth. I am grateful to Elizabeth Snowden, the Archdeacon of Chelmsford, who chairs our environmental group and other concerned Christians in our diocese for helping me prepare this letter. Here is a list of events being planned locally and nationally this autumn that you may wish to find out more about.

### **October 7-20 2019, Extinction Rebellion UK Action, central London**

As a diocese we may not be able to fully endorse all of Extinction Rebellion's actions, but nonetheless we know that in the Chelmsford diocese many churches and individuals are already concerned and are praying, talking and taking actions. We are now encouraging churches to go one step further between October 6th and October 20th to raise awareness and to take time to reflect on the issues we are all facing.

#### **A first step is to pray.**

This beautiful prayer was used in April this year during Climate Action Week. It talks about the web of life that we are part of and that as Christians we believe was created and is loved by Almighty God. If possible, please join with churches across the diocese in using this prayer in your Sunday services on October 6th and 13th.

#### ***We Hold the Earth***

*We hold brothers and sisters who suffer from storms and droughts intensified by climate change.*

*We hold all species that suffer.*

*We hold world leaders delegated to make decisions for life.*

*We pray that the web of life may be mended through courageous actions to limit carbon emissions.*

*We pray for right actions for adaptation and mitigation to help our already suffering earth community.*

*We pray that love and wisdom might inspire my actions and our actions as communities so that we may, with integrity, look into the eyes of brothers and sisters and all beings and truthfully say, we are doing our part to care for them and the future of the children.*

*May love transform us and our world with new steps toward life.*

## **Open the doors of our churches**

We are also encouraging all churches to open their doors so that people can come together to pray and reflect during the two weeks of action, reaching out to both congregation members and those outside the church. There may already be those in your congregations and parishes who are grieving for what is happening to God's beautiful creation, and this may be a time when we as clergy can come alongside individuals in their sorrow and desire for action.

## **Peaceful protest**

We recognise that not everyone across the churches of our diocese will be comfortable with public protests albeit non-violent peaceful protest. It is worth noting however, that there is a long history of Christians taking a public stand for matters of faith and justice. Christian Climate Action have been working for many years to raise awareness of climate change and support Christians in thinking about their response to this. Between October 7<sup>th</sup> and October 20<sup>th</sup> this year, Christian Climate Action will be joining with Extinction Rebellion to proclaim the truth about the emergency the world is facing. They will be joining with other faith groups on Westminster Bridge during that period to pray, talk, sing, and dance. <https://rebellion.earth/event/faith-bridge-at-the-xr-international-rebellion-uk/> Many who are deeply concerned about the climate emergency will be converging on London between 7<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> October from all parts of the country at their own expense to urge the government to act. Those from churches in London may want demonstrate our solidarity by offering accommodation. Those who are willing to do this can contact the organisers of the action directly through this form.
